40 Speaks about the fee's.  
41 Spoke about how the Senate does not have any fee review oversight.  
42 Gives overview of the fee review process.  
43 First time I can recall three fee's being reduced or eliminated. These are going to be  
44 covered by the provost. Details information about this student activities fees. Moves  
45 into the student center operations fee.

47 Sen. Hutcherson: I have asked about the personnel costs for the Student center and was  
48 not provided it.

49  
50 A: I was under the impression that the folks reviewing the fees were provided the  
51 information they needed.

52 Recreational sports fee - overview.

53 Athletics - \$50 for operations

54 Student Health Service - \$13 to fund salary and benefit increases, new LAN tech  
55 position.

56 Transit Operations \$16 - \$8 for 3 new busses. \$5 for U-Pass program. \$3 for  
57 Visualization system.

59 Wolfline system.)

63 Sen. Hutcherson: is there any money left over from the reserve.

65 A: No

67 Sen. Walton: Do you think the review process was fair. Do you have any answer to the  
68 delay tactics from the administration.

69

70 A: I strongly resent you use of the word delay tactics. It is unfounded that any  
71 administrator delayed the fees. I made sure that this year we did not release the  
72 information this year until it was finalized and approved.

73

74 Sen. Walton: Are we going to review how we review fees

75

76 A: We constantly review the process.

77

78 Sen. Compton: Do you think we are wasting our time here tonight?

79

80 A: it depends on how you respond to the process.

81

82 A: BOG policy from 2003 trumps the local rules, each campus has a BOT, the BOT  
83 handles the recombination of the fees up to the BOG.

84

85 Sen. Dimond: The student body president at each school is the BOT voting member?

86

87 A: yes.

88

89 Sen. Hutcherson: How are we in comparison to other schools in comparison to fees?

90

91 A: He listed some figures.

92

93 Sen. Hutcherson: Senate chambers is unprofessional tonight due to the call to the fire  
94  
95 Marshall, do you know who called the Fire Marshall.

97 A: I have no idea who called, but I will try to find out.

99 Motion to override the Veto of GB 12. 2nd.

101 Sen. Fabricius : When we passed this bill 2 weeks ago we knew how the president stood.  
102 We need to go ahead and pass this bill.  
103 Move to previous question.  
104 35-10 the veto is over ridden.

108 - Mr. Seneca Toms, Student Body Treasurer  
109 Appointing a new Comptroller. Fall 138 requests filled. Table update, the tables are  
110 now in the warehouse should be here by next session.  
111 Sen. Fabricius Consent to accept the resignation of the comptroller.

113 - Mr. Whil Piavis, Student Body President  
114 Let me clear the air a little bit. It is not a insult for me to wear the pirate garb here in  
115 the senate chambers. I am here to have fun and a good time. I hope that ye be having

189 Comments/Announcements

190

191 Sen. Fabricius: One of the ways to be effective is to be knowledgeable about the fee  
192 process. I was pleased to see that the administrator had to yield to students about the fee  
193 details.

194

195 Travis Birdsell: SG is sponsoring a blood drive Oct 21 11-3:30 in BAR. We need people  
196 to help and to give blood. The T&F committee did a good job and I support what they  
197 did.

198

199 Sen. Mickey: Homecoming committee is doing a good job.

200

201 Sen. Hankins: I was impressed with the retreat and had a good time. I want to the thank  
202 the freshman senators for dressing up and being prepared tonight.

203

204 Sen. Sevits: [Addresses the Senate and those in attendance] Correct me if I'm wrong, but  
205 I believe this to be true. This is the only time that a group made up of a majority of  
206 students gets to review collectively the changes made to student fees every year. If you  
207 feel student input is important on this issue, I want to remind everyone this is what we're  
208 here for, and this is one of the most important things we do.

209

210 Sen. Hutcherson: I want to thank the folks who came out for the student retreat. It took 4  
211 younger folks to subdue me in laser tag.

212

213 Sen. Yasin. I am proud of us for being here tonight, in these terrible chairs.

214

215 Sen. Compton: I hope we all come in and go to the call in time for the national call in  
216 day. To keep school affordable.

217

218 Sen. Phillips: Idea is to get 10,000 signatures to oppose the tuition change.

219

220 SSP Hinton: I want to thank John Small for his work on the fee review committee.

221

222 Student Body Comments on Fees

223

224 Students wishing to speak should sign-up in the back of the Senate Hall. The total  
225 comment period is a maximum of 45 minutes with two minutes per student.

226

227 Bobby Blair, Parks and Rec.: Address the Rec. Fee. Right now we are understaffed. and  
228 the increase in the fee would help keep retention. In recreational sport we have trouble  
229 recruiting and retaining them.

230

231 Megan, graphic design, student theater. This is a research university, and we need  
232 creativity to create new things. One of the great things about this university is that we are  
233 open to everyone. Every person can apply for acting or tech unlike schools that have a  
234 direct theater major. This is a great program and we really need the increase.

235

236 Casey Watkins, Senior in zoology, We in CALS do support the arts. We provide an outlet  
237 for campus. I think the arts is essential to a well-rounded education.

238

239 Scott Heath, Junior, CPE, I am reminded of a sense of balance. This is a great release to  
240 have. There are a lot of avenues that this release is for.

241

242 Josh Parker, Senior in Chass, The Arts are not just part of a well-rounded education, this  
243 is a culture issue to teach you about the rest of the world. We are doing a diversity  
244 discussion along with a play about BGL issues. The craft center is really great for people  
245 to get their hand in making something. It also serves the community. Our dance program  
246 is nationally known and we need to take this seriously. The arts are going to be in serious  
247 trouble without this fee.

248

249 Travis Birdsell: The arts should be important to everyone. The request for the arts should  
250 be separate from the student center operation fees. Even if we pass all the fee request the  
251 SCO does not have to give the arts the money they requested. For next year we need a  
252 separate arts fee.

253

254 Bardy Maze, senior in Political Science: We have had many wonderful students in these  
255 chambers before, who has passed fee increased before. The future of our university  
256 depends on us supporting the arts. We are providing an outlet for students on campus to  
257 be creative.

258

259 Darryl Jones, COD, You talked a lot so we will talk a lot now. If you are not involved in  
260 the arts, you have to know that the arts here on campus are nationally known. The craft  
261 center is one of the most comprehensive in the country. I want to reiterate how important  
262 this fee is.

263

264 Randy Cotton, Senior Business Management, The salary needs to be increased, as it has  
265 not been in the last 6 years. The temp labor is going to intramural program, if we don't  
266 have officials we can't have games. To increase the hours for the facilities we need to  
267 have more money. The downtime for machines will be reduced with more funds.

268 Website: we need someone to provide a better website for scheduling facilities.

269

270 Whil Langley: Thank you. We have great leadership in this room. I wanted to ask more  
271 questions to Dr. Stafford. He asked the groups who are requesting fee increases not to  
272 come to the meeting. I went to the Monday night meeting and they did a great job  
273 breaking down the fees and going over the fees. Thank you for your service and  
274 leadership.

275

276 Kattie Parker, Ag mang: We are expected to work during breaks, in the summer, so that  
277 you can have access to more facilities. We need this increase to pay for the retention of  
278 student workers.

279

280 Bobby: Our students have spent weeks working on the proposal for the \$0.50 increase.  
281 This did not come out of the blue, students worked on this proposal.

282

283 Salie Hamdon, Staff, as a work-study student I got offers for \$6 from the gym, instead I  
284 took the \$8 offers.

285

286 Jessie Stuart, Senior, CHE, \$22 of the increase will go to the arts (the admin. have  
287 promised it). I chose to come to NCState because of the option for me to be involved in  
288 theater. We do constantly good work, the N&O used to review our shows and we  
289 normally beat the other programs in the area. We will not be able to provide as many  
290 programs and as large and costly programs as we now offer.

291

292 Randy: Recreational Leisure fee. The programs stated are not new, the are just going to  
293 be enhanced. The programs could be better with more funding.

294

295 [Unknown Speaker]: Address the comment about Dr. Stafford. It would have taken a lot  
296 more time to have presentations from the programs. The problem with an Arts fee, it  
297 would take a long time and be hard. It would be like a divorce and would aggravate the  
298 process.

299

300 Derwood Kendy, Senior , COE, This is for students, UNC-G and NCSU are the only  
301 schools that get access to the theater program. It is important to pass this as the funds will  
302 come to us.

303

350 Sen. Lam: Looked at each section of the request. 3.20 pers 1.20 pool, 1.50 weight cardio.  
351  
352 Sen. Cariaga: Pers, They will cut programs if this is cut. Hours of the gym would be  
353 reduced.  
354  
355 Q: Sen. Shivers: How will the votes tonight affect the Fee review committees actions  
356  
357 A: The committee normally goes along with what the senate approves.  
358  
359 Debate:  
360 Pos:  
361 Motion to amend. Insert 3.80 into the bill for increasing the wages.  
362  
363 P: Heath: The \$6 an hour is just barely over min wage. With an increase in the wage we  
364 might get more hours and more workers.  
365

366 N: Fabricius. Increasing the wages does not increase hours. There is some dispute over  
367 the notion that they have full recruitment. in the areas that they have weak retention they  
368 could do targeted wage increases.  
369  
370 Q: Would you work for \$6 and hour A: No.  
371  
372 P: Melton: Maintaining labor is an issue. This would help retain workers.  
373  
374 N: Walton: we have plenty of people wanting to work in campus rec.  
375  
376 P: Yasin: I have worked retail jobs. They were a whole lot easier than the work at the  
377 gym.  
378  
379 N: Hutcherson: This is a temp job. The committee as well as myself feels this is  
380 unwarranted.  
381  
382 N: Sarwy: I worked a very hard job at \$5.15 and I feel that a raise is not worthy for the  
383 work they do.  
384  
385 Q: Walton: was there discussion about increasing the non-student fees? A: They have  
386 already increased the NS fees.  
387  
388 P: Compton: in support  
389  
390 N: Adams: There are students willing to work at these jobs. There are some jobs that are  
391 hard, but there are others that can do their homework and not work hard.  
392  
393 P: Phillips: I spoke with Bobby Blair. The retention has hurt them, it would help them  
394 have more hours.  
395  
396 Q: Godfrey. Why are they not spending the money they have now?  
397  
398 A: ...  
399  
400 Q: Wally: are these jobs reserved for students  
401  
402 A: Yes.  
403  
404 N: Cariaga: No one is being forced for \$6. This small increase will not really affect the  
405 hours and retention.  
406  
407 Q: Dimond: How much more do managers get? A: no idea  
408  
409 P: Salama: I support this bill, the 30% retention rate is very high and a change needs to be  
410 made.  
411

412 Debate has ended.  
413  
414 Motion to extend. not passed.  
415  
416 Vote: Heath Amendment: Nays have it.  
417  
418 Debate:  
419  
420 N: Melton: This will only keep the gym as it is right now. If we want things to get better  
421 we have to offer an increase. I urge someone to offer an amendment to increase the fee  
422 recommendation.  
423  
424 P: Hankins: The committee had great deliberation over this issue. This would affect  
425 everyone on campus, so we have to try to keep the fees down. This is doing the best good  
426 for the most people.  
427  
428 N: Mickey: The hours are the last thing that will be changed.  
429  
430 P: Sevits:  
431  
432 Q: Compton: Can they do whatever they want? (administration) A: Yes.  
433  
434 P: Fabricius: Could not hear  
435  
436 P: Walton: Turnover is bad and this would not fix it.  
437  
438 P: Mckethan: I think the gym should do a better job adv.  
439  
440 N: Sawry: What is the recreation leisure program:

479 The motion to adopt R 48, Recreational Sports Fee Act, requiring two-thirds support, was  
480 agreed to by a margin of 44-1.

481

482 [R 49, Student Self Service Fee Act (Lam et al)]

484 Lam: The provost is paying this.

485

486 Consent passes

488 [R 47, Athletics Fee Act (Lam et al)]

489

490 Lam: Two parts: Operations: Zero is supported for operations. Indebtedness: \$5 was  
491 supported. As students are only responsible for part of the funds, we should only bear  
492 part of the increases.

493

494 Q: Compton: Bill should read 4.5 Million

495 Debate:

496

497 P: Fabricius: This just shift the burden more on the students without and justification. The  
498 fact that they were informed not to give us information to make an informed opinion.

499

500 N: Compton: We need to strike the \$5 from the bill

501

502 P: Hankins: The \$5 goes directly to something we use and we should fund part of the  
503 burden for the increases.

504  
505 N: Saunders: I don't support giving them any money because they don't listen to the  
506 students  
507  
508 Amend: Compton: Change \$5 to \$0.  
509  
510 Explain: Athletics has the budget to pay for this themselves.  
511  
512 P: Salama: If they can't raise the money to fix the items then they don't need the facilities.  
513  
514 N: Lloyd: I see groups out there everyday, we need to help pay for something we use.  
515  
516 P: Sawrey: I don't think that we need to fork out 150k to use a grass field.  
517  
518 N: Fabricius: This is an athletic facility. Track field and softball. This will increase  
519 accessibility to students to soccer. We need to support this new facility.  
520  
521 P: Wally: They have a lot of money already. The students on campus can't afford any  
522 increase.  
523  
524 N: Lam: The purpose is to bring sports to campus. They don't have the money to pay this  
525 and we need to pass it.  
526  
527 Vote: Nays win  
528  
529 Back to org bill debate:  
530  
531 P: Cariaga: \$5 out of \$75 is very small.  
532  
533 N: Salama: They are a cash cow and can generate tons of funds. You just voted down to  
534 give money to student employees, but you are going to vote to give money to the track.  
535  
536 Q: Sawrey:  
537  
538 P: Hutcherson: If you build it they will come. Ours is falling apart. We need to fix it.  
539  
540 N: Yasin: I talked about this with my constituents, students are having financial problems  
541 paying for school as is, and they felt this fee was least important, talked to textile student  
542 council and only person voted for increase  
543  
544 P: Melton: They came with a larger amount, if we had changed to zero they would not  
545 have taken seriously, we need to pass this  
546  
547 N: Compton: If we don't say anything they wont assume that we are in favor, they have  
548 plenty of money, they aren't going to build this facility with 150k  
549

550 P: Adams: They cant get revenue from donors, donors usually give money for revenue  
551 building sports, this helps the students  
552  
553 Q: Is our soccer team ranked. A: Yes  
554  
555 Q: Compton: Is this a rolling amount over a number of years. A: Yes, if enrollment goes  
556 up fee goes away faster  
557  
558 Q: Hutcherson: In the opinion of the chair , if we were not to make a recommendation  
559 how would the board see that A: I think this is a bad idea  
560

567 N: Mickey: I have heard a lot of negative feedback about student health center, not using  
568 money wisely as is, so why should we give more money  
569  
570 P: Compton: I disagree with what you said, I think the health services are very  
571 professional and money will help  
572  
573 N: Most hospitals etc do not have medical records on computer  
574  
575 P: Melton: health center provides help for appropriate services  
576  
577 N: Mickey: health center is not reliable  
578  
579 P: Phillips: They do a lot of things on campus, health care in this country is trying to  
580 make everything electronic, we should start here
